FELIX, OUR DOORMAN MAKES THE NEWS - OPINION



I'm 70 years old and planning to retire next year so I can spend more time with my wife. That means this month will be the last time I assist my union, 32BJ of the Service Employees International Union, to

negotiate an updated labor contract for Westchester's proud residential workers. My hope is to win a strong new contract for the doormen and women who will keep my profession thriving. We rely on our employer-paid healthcare. Plus, I myself need a good pension, since Social Security won't even cover my rent when I retire. There are 1,400 of us in all. We are the door-people, porters, handy-people and supers who run 500 co-ops and condo buildings that more than 100,000 Hudson Valley residents call home. The last years have been like nothing I've ever seen over the course of my 35-year career as a doorman.

When the pandemic hit, most people sheltered in place. But not us. We got up every morning so residents could stay home. It was a scary time. No one understood the new virus. We were adapting and innovating as we went, sanitizing peoples' grocery deliveries, helping people quarantine and masking up. Tragically, not all of us survived the pandemic. At least one Hudson Valley residential worker tragically passed away due to complications from COVID-19. Some things have gone back to normal — other things have changed forever. When the pandemic hit, people started shopping online like never before. Boxes now start arriving at 6 a.m. and it continues all day long. FedEx comes a few times a day, Amazon comes a few times a day, USPS and UPS come once a day. And now they all deliver on Sundays (including USPS, but just parcels). It's a new normal. And it's a lot of work for us. The number of packages I get in one day is now what I used to get in one week.

When I've gotten sick over the years, our employer-paid healthcare has been a lifeline. I don't know what I would have done without it the time I had to stay in the hospital for 23 days. My wife has some chronic health challenges. There's no way I could afford her medications without the healthcare benefits we get from the job.

When residents got sick and had to quarantine, we were their primary contact with the outside world — delivering groceries and essentials right to their door. This helped keep everyone safe. We workers have to be taken care of, too.

Our labor contract expires on Sept. 30. Now is the time to show that the gratitude we received during the pandemic leads to recognition via wage increases and pension improvements so we can survive during these difficult times. Support Westchester's essential frontline residential workers this month because I'm sure readers agree, we all deserve a secure future.

UPDATE OF OUR KEY SAFE



The BoD is in the process of updating our secure key safe. It is important that there is a copy of your house keys in the safe in case of an emergency. Although residents are unaware of the many times that keys are needed, and as long as there is a copy of your keys locked in the safe,

emergencies can be easily handled and resolved. Residents have needed to get their keys when they inadvertently let their doors slam behind them as they realize their keys are inside the apartment, in cases when there is a medical emergency and the resident needs immediate help or can't get to the door, or in cases when a leak occurs and the staff need to get into the apartment if the resident is out or on vacation, just to name a few. For those who worry about the security of their apartment, in all the years that The Greystone Coop has kept keys in the safe there has never been a case of anyone getting a key and entering an apartment without permission. The keys are kept in a locked safe, which is in a locked boardroom, which is in a locked community room. There is no chance of your keys being stolen. Over the years, locks have been changed and residents have come and gone and the keys have not

been checked. Gary, Bill and Susan are checking the keys to make sure that there is, locked in the safe, a functioning key for every unit. Instructions will be sent to every resident as to when we will be doing the key checks. If there is not a key to check, those residents will be asked to supply a labeled key to placed in the safe. This will start the 2nd week of October and will be a quick and simple process. We appreciate your cooperation and help in getting this done for the safety and welfare of all.
