Told from the perspective of six characters, *Horse* interweaves the story of the Black equestrians who made their white masters fabulously wealthy with those of contemporary young professionals struggling to form relationships despite racial microaggressions and misunderstandings.

END OF YEAR WINDFALL

It has come to the editors' attention that there may be residents who are not aware that they have money/funds that they can claim. These monies are with the New York State Comptroller's Office. This money may come from unused gift certificates, refunds for returned items in retail stores or more significant amounts of money coming from unclaimed tax refunds, dividend funds, etc. In order to claim what is yours and get a check in the mail, you must Google - "New York State Comptroller - Unclaimed Funds". Enter your last and first name and any money in your name will be listed. You have to verify your address, checking to see if you have ever lived at the address listed, as there may be others with your same name, put in your info and you will get a check in the mail for the funds that have been unclaimed. There have already been residents at The Greystone who received their money in as little as a week or two, so don't hesitate to check this out. Hoping that you find a pleasant end of the year surprise waiting for you.

Compactor Room Cleanliness

We all want our building to be clean, free of insects and rodents, and be kept in the best condition possible. We have a maintenance committee that walks the building monthly to make sure that nothing is missed and to catch the little things that may have been overlooked, They work with the board and staff to bring to our attention things that can be improved. One of the constant issues involve the compactor rooms, The staff does their best to keep them clean, but is important that all residents do their part as well. We can all help if we do the following things.

- ✓ All garbage <u>MUST</u> be bagged and tied before putting into the chute. <u>Push</u> bagged garbage down the chute before closing the door.
- ✓ Put only CLEAN recyclables in the appropriate bins
- ✓ Please break down cereal boxes (Costco size) and to put in the bin,
- ✓ Pizza boxes must be broken down and thrown down the chute.
- ✓ Do not leave large boxes, items, or large bags of plastic bottles in compactor room, place them in the halls near the laundry rooms.
- ✓ Wipe updates any accidental spills, pick up anything you drop.
- ✓ NEVER put GLASS down the chute! If something is brokenness put it aside in a paper bag and label it as "broken glass" to keep our staff safe.

Remember, the Greystone is home to all of us. Let's work together to keep it clean and to make it a happy, healthy place to live.
