We certainly have had our community tested beyond its limits. Because of the crew working through the night on Christmas Eve and Day to restore our heat and hot water, we were spared the crisis of

having to vacate the building. We thank them for forgoing the holiday with their families and spending it in a cold boiler room so we could have heat and hot water. Yes, because the gas for the building was turned off, this certainly disrupted our daily lives in that we could not cook our favorite meals and have the convenience of drying our clothes in the laundry room for an undetermined amount of time, which could have been many months.

Despite rumors and misinformation swirling around, we still rose to the occasion and pulled together, getting us through this crisis and meeting the challenge to find ways of adjusting to temporary routines of living.

As we moved ahead, the Key committee was formed to go door to door for the time-consuming testing of keys to access apartments for plumbers to change stove valves and flex hoses bringing all up to code. Most residents were pleasant and very cooperative. Thank you! One positive outcome, besides our resilience, is that all stove valves and flex hoses will be up to code.

When the news was received that the dryers have been restored for use in both laundry rooms, you could almost hear a shout of joy throughout the building. This was a sign that we are on our way back to normal! We are nearing completion of replacing all stove valves and hoses within a few days. Once this is done and ConEd approves the gas to be turned on for the building, we will be able to cook again. So, start getting menus ready!

Maintenance Projects

The Greystone continues its ongoing maintenance including...

- The garage project is near completion. Due to the good weather this winter, the workers were able to continue working during December and January.
- Thanks to Joel Bloom for his hard work in organizing the moving of cars and parking spots.
- We are making great progress with the replacement of the flexible gas hose and gas valve behind the ovens. The men working have been quick, competent and respectful of our residents and property and everything has been proceeding smoothly. All our units should be complete by Monday, February 6th.
- All the efforts of Keith, Max and our "team" paid off with the restoration of our dryers on January 27th, as quickly as could have been expected.

Monthly Financial Report

We started the new year with approximately \$1.5 million in our reserve funds. After making payments for both the garage and boiler projects, our balance is approximately \$1 million. A more accurate and detailed report will be available at our next meeting.

There are a limited number of raised bed garden spaces. Applications for a space will be accepted from early Feb to Feb 28, and we'll contact those who are accepted in early March. Those without a raised bed assignment

can do container gardening, if they choose. There are several containers available, or residents can bring their own. We also will work to have a "Pick Your Own" garden area that will be available for all Greystone residents. An Open Garden session is planned for every Saturday from 10 am to 11 am, starting in April or May. Residents who are interested can come to the garden at this time and get an orientation. Gardeners can come together to discuss planting, crops, watering, and other issues or problems. All residents are welcome to come help in the garden.

What can we do as good citizens to help our planet?

Our first goal will be addressing how to reduce the amount of garbage produced at the Greystone. There are recycling and composting solutions for just about everything we purchase or use.

Our building staff work hard to collect the paper, cans, glass, cardboard, and plastic for recycling. Recycling works and keeps these materials out of the incinerator and out of landfills and waterways. We could all learn to be better at recycling, and we'll be talking about best practices for recycling at environmental meetings and will also look into touring the County recycling and composting facilities.

About 95% of food scraps are thrown away and end up in landfills, where they emit methane, a potent greenhouse gas. Composting food scraps instead of throwing them away is not hard. It's easy, once it becomes a habit. Yonkers is joining many other communities in Westchester and around the country in promoting <u>FOOD SCRAP RECYCLING</u> by composting. By composting food scraps, you are helping to create a useful product that gives back to our life cycle - and also helps local gardens thrive!

Food scraps accepted at local composting centers.

ALL FOOD, including:

- Fruits and Vegetables (Remove stickers, bands & ties)
- Meat and Poultry (Boned permitted)
- Fish and Shellfish (Shells permitted)
- Dairy Products
- Bread and Pasta
- Rice and Grains
- Egg Shells
- Chips and Snacks
- Nuts and Seeds
- Leftover, Spoiled and Expired Food (Cooked)
- Coffee Grounds (Paper filters are ok)

- Tea Bags (No staples)
- Paper towels and Napkins
- Cut Flowers
- Compostable bags (NO plastic bags)

Wouldn't you agree that all the items on this list are items we use almost daily? Imagine how much less trash would be accumulated if we could ALL do this! One resident who is already recycling food scraps estimates it is about 70% of all her trash. Currently there are about 15 people at the Greystone who recycle food scraps voluntarily and bring to the Recycling facility on Saw Mill River Road, 735 Saw Mill River Road, Yonkers, Mon-Sat, 7:30 am-4:15 pm. Hopefully, the City of Yonkers will soon provide curbside pick-up for food scraps!

If you want to start in composting, the Environmental Committee can help you! Contact a committee member or come to a meeting to learn about composting at the Greystone.

The Yonkers Department of Public Works can also help you get started composting! The Yonkers DPW offers food scrap kits for purchase for \$20 at the Yonkers Recycling Center on 735 Saw Mill River Road, Yonkers. Kits include one 1.9-gallon countertop pail, one six-gallon home storage and transportation bin and a roll of 25 compostable bags. Filled bags can be dropped off at the Recycling Center, and the County Department of Environmental Facilities (DEF) then will later compost the scraps.

Westchester County Executive George Latimer stated,

"This program has far reaching benefits for our County, our local municipalities – but more importantly the environment. With Yonkers joining the County's Residential Food Scrap Transportation & Disposal (RFSTAD) program, our largest City with our highest population is now helping Westchester lead the charge for a more sustainable future. Congratulations to the City, Mayor Spano and our Department of Environmental Facilities for their efforts."

Let's join with these city-wide and county-wide efforts and do our part!

Laundry Room
