MONTHLY REPORTS TO THE COMMUNITY

Management Updates

- The City of Yonkers inspector is scheduled for Friday, March. 31st after which Con Edison will turn on the gas for the 4 final lines 15, 16, 24, and 26th. This should take place by the end of the first week in April and, finally, all apartments will have their gas restored.
- The garage project is ongoing, and the engineer is now working to come up with a proposal for fireproofing. This should be completed before the pool is filled.
- Pool deck repairs will begin shortly with flat roof work needed in the pool area and the elevator ceiling of the G5 floor/G4 ceiling area
- Ongoing spring spruce-up will begin. The
 north garage entrance door was replaced, and
 other replacements and repairs will be done as
 needed. Residents are asked to enter any
 repair needed in their apartments, or as noticed
 in public areas, in the work order book at the
 doorman's station.

Gas Leak Update

The final four lines, lines 15, 16, 24, and 26, were inspected and the gas will be turned on within the next week. This was a difficult situation which required much planning, time and cooperation but we have managed to get through this together and the worse is over. A heartfelt thank you to all residents, without whose cooperation the restoration of our gas would have been more difficult and would have been dragged out for a much longer time period.

Financial Report Update

As was discussed previously, our two large projects – Garage and Boiler – took a big bite out of our reserve fund. The board was aware of this and had planned to have a sizeable amount available for this purpose, as the boiler replacement and garage repairs were desperately needed. The emergency gas leak and shut off was an unexpected expense, but since our building is financially sound, we had the funds needed for these projects. The BoD has already planned for the replenishing of our reserve funds. We won't have exact numbers until all our bills are paid, probably within the next month or so. At that time a report will be sent to all shareholders.

News, were moved to the shelves beneath the Return Box. We are working with the Playroom Committee to move most of the children's books from the Playroom to the Library so they will be more accessible.

Library Committee is advocating for some needed maintenance in the room: a complete stripping and polishing of the floor, the addition of more electrical outlets so people can plug in laptops and charge phones, and the sealing of all holes to keep book loving mice out. We are fortunate to have this comfortable, quiet place, where anyone may come to find a book, borrow a magazine, read a newspaper, do a puzzle, work on their laptop, read a book to a child, or just sit in a comfortable chair and think. We hope you enjoy it!
