Now that Spring has arrived, I am pleased to say over this past year the board has accomplished many projects keeping our building in good shape. Now we can breathe a bit easier knowing we are safe from any gas tragedies, and we can rest that our garage structure is safe as the restoration is nearing its completion. High-tech energy efficient boilers have been installed which have been the topic of prior boards for several years.

As you know, every May our annual meeting is held when we elect new directors to fill the outgoing director's seats on the board. This year three seats need to be filled. By now you should have receive the mailing which includes the profiles of the individuals seeking to be elected. Remember that your ballot must be in by May 8th at noon using one of the ways described in the mailing.

MONTHLY REPORTS TO THE COMMUNITY Maintenance Projects

Ongoing maintenance continues at The Greystone....

- The pipe installation in the boiler room is underway. The lighting in the boiler room was completed. The next phase is to address the wall and ceiling.
- There have been unexplained power surges which caused the boilers to stop running. These surges also disrupted the security system. Con Ed has been contacted to evaluate their service to the building for the cause. Our building's engineer is working to find some mechanism to keep the boilers running should another power surge occur, as an option.
- The process of reinforcing the rusted beam at the G4 floor level/G3 ceiling level is completed. Beam replacement under the pool was, also, performed this past week. This needed to be reinforced before the pool water filter equipment is reinstalled, since it is located under the pool by the water filter. The pool could

not be filled until the reinforcement took place. Management has been following this closely so that all the work is completed in preparation for the upcoming pool season.

- Management is addressing the existing fire proofing material, as the existing fire proofing has been flaking, impacting on vehicles. Management is continuing to review available options to find the best way to address this problem.
- The gas is fully restored in the building, and is completely up and running, both in the common areas and individual apartments. All leaks have been addressed.
- Repairs were performed on the pool deck, around the railroad elevator bulkhead. Coping stones were repaired on the roof, as was the flashing. During a recent wind storm, a portion of the flashing on the south elevator bulkhead wall blew off and was replaced.
- The pool deck is being power washed in anticipation of the upcoming pool season. That work began this past Wednesday and will take approximately 3-4 days. As the other work and support beams have been completed and the pool deck power washed, after an inspection the pool can be filled and become operational in time for the pool season beginning Memorial Day weekend.
- Spring "spruce-up" is now underway with ongoing buffing, cleaning, painting, carpet cleaning and other repairs and maintenance ongoing.

.<u>Guide to Area Famrer's Markets</u>

It is that time of the year and farmers' markets are just opening this month. Farmers' markets began as a way for farmers to sell the fruits and vegetables they'd grown. Today, they've evolved into much more, as you'll also find a wide variety of interesting, unusual and delicious artisan products. The following are some of the best local farmers' markets for you to visit....

The TaSH

In four short years, the TaSH (short for Tarrytown Sleepy Hollow) has become a neighborhood destination with visitors shopping, then picnicking, at the park while listening to live music. Run by the Rivertown Village Green, a 503c organization supported by volunteers from Sleepy Hollow and Tarrytown, the group reserves four community tables weekly and offers food access and shopper-rewards programs for families, veterans and seniors; educational children's activities; a Thanksgiving dessert contest; and bilingual translation throughout the market. Patriots Park – Route 9 Tarrytown Sat, 8:30 a.m.–2 p.m. through November 23

Hastings Farmers' Market Founded in 1998, the market, has an average of 30-35 purveyors per week. Market Bucks supplement the SNAP/EDT program, a scholarship is available for a Hastings High School student, and food and financial support is provided to the Hastings Food Pantry (a donation jar is at the market table through June). Food-scrap recycling, children's programs, the Veggie Valet (to keep purchases cold), and even free WiFi are offered.

Hastings Library parking lot -7 Maple Ave Sat, 8:30 a.m.-1:30 p.m.

Irvington Farmers' Market Colorful bistro tables and chairs set out for patrons to listen to musical acts, free yoga class being offered on the grass, and kids playing on the playground set the stage for **one of the area's only Sunday markets.**

Main Street School parking lot – 110 Main Street Sun, 9 a.m.–1:30 p.m. through Nov 24

New Rochelle Farmers' Market

The market, begun in 1991, has a warm vibe and a long history in the community as the county's oldest market. Thomas Paine Cottage Museum - 20 Sicard Avenue *Fri, 9 a.m.-2 p.m. until Nov 22*

Ossining Farmers' Market

The Ossining Farmers' Market was founded 28 years ago with two vendors. Today, the market averages 15-20 on any given Saturday morning, accepts Snap/EBT, and hosts music acts and special events like Coffee with a Cop, when residents can chat with local police. English and Spanish are used at the market. Corner of Main St and Spring St (parking lot) *Sat, 8:30 a.m.–1p.m. year-round*

REMINDERS:

Please do not park in the circular driveway or North driveway for more than 15 minutes to drop off groceries, etc. Cars parked in these areas cause a serious hazard for drivers leaving and entering the garage or making the turn in front of the building. Let's cooperate and keep our neighbors and friends safe.

If you need a repair or see something in the public areas of the building that needs attention, please enter it in the work order book located at the doorman's desk.

Do not leave large bags of trash that do not fit in the compactor shoot under the shelf in the compactor room. Bring it down to the basement for the staff to discard. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated and will prevent insect and rodent infestation, especially during the summer months.
