### A MESSAGE FROM BILL AND SUSAN

Dear Neighbors and Friends,

It's hard to believe, but the summer is flying quickly, and it is already August. We hope that everyone is enjoying the warm weather and, when it is too warm, as we have had several heat waves, we hope that you are safe, staying cool and hydrated.



In talking to some shareholders, I think the concept of a Cooperative is

misunderstood as being the same as owning a condominium.

A co-op owner has an interest or shares in the entire building and a contract or lease that allows the owner to occupy a unit. While a condo owner owns a unit, a co-op owner **does not own** the unit. Co-ops are collectively owned by their residents, who own shares in a nonprofit corporation and elect a Board of Directors that manages the building for the shareholders.

The motto "Building the Greystone Community *Together!*" emphasizes we are truly a community; we all share in the care of our building. Living in a Coop is more than just paying our monthly maintenance, it is taking ownership and doing things beyond the walls of our unit for the good of the whole community. This concept may mean a shift in our understanding from prior experiences of owning a house or renting an apartment. While we have House Rules which keep our lives organized and considerate of each other, the cooperative experience goes beyond rules. Living in a cooperative fosters a community spirit where we are encouraged to do that little extra for the good of all. Doing that little extra can be as simple as picking paper up from the floor in the hallways or softener sheets that drop on the laundry floor, wiping up laundry detergent when it

spills on the floor or down the front of the washing machine, to washing our recyclable containers out before putting in the recycle bin, bagging and pushing garbage down the chute in the compactor rooms, and not leaving large bags of garbage and boxes in the compactor rooms but bringing them down to the basement in the designated areas, which will keep rodents from taking up residence in our building. By doing these simple acts of caring, it allows our staff to focus on the bigger areas that need tending to, which keep our building looking good. The care I have witnessed in our community goes beyond the few examples I mentioned above. We also have watched out for each other's safety by driving through the garage in a safe manner

Our wish and encouragement for all is that while we live in our apartments, we will become aware that we are members of this Greystone Community and share in the care and responsibility for the whole building.

# Summer Pool Season 2024



Our pool opened on May 25th for the 2024 pool season and we are having a very successful summer. In

a time when there are lifeguard shortages, we have a list of 9 lifeguards to cover all our shifts. This was no easy accomplishment. Our pool has been kept clean and inviting and usage seems to be picking up, as our afternoons are getting busier with kids returning from camp and adults taking a swim after work. Of course, our pool "regulars" can be found basically rain or shine, swimming laps, submerged to keep cool, or doing water exercises. During the hot days of summer, and especially during these heat waves that we have been experiencing, the water heats up and feels as if we have our pool heater on. This is not the case. The water is not being heated by us but, instead, is being heated by the sun. There is nothing that we can do about this. We cannot add cold water, as this disrupts the balance of chemicals in the pool and, in addition, if the water level gets too high, it can cause the skimmers to not work properly. Once the heat waves are over and the nights get cooler, the water will cool down during the night and the pool temperature during the day will be more refreshing. Finally, our lifeguards are on duty to keep us safe. They are in charge when they are on duty and their directions must be followed. If a lifeguard gives directions to leave the pool, as there is thunder in the distance, you must follow these directions. Thunder is followed by lightning, almost immediately. If you hear thunder, lightning is nearby. At the first sound of thunder everyone must vacate the pool and must not return until 30 minutes after the last clap of thunder. The lifeguard will let you know when it is safe to return to the pool. Please follow the lifeguard's directions. We want everyone to have a safe and happy pool season and to enjoy time on the pool deck.

We are in the middle of biking season. The South and North county trails along the Saw Mill River Parkway are off road, paved, smooth and beautiful for biking. The Yonkers Department of Sanitation has an excellent recycling center at 735 Sawmill River Rd. ### COMPACTOR ROOM CARE

Greystone residents work very hard to take care of the compactor rooms. We all know how important it is to keep them clean and free from food scraps so that we don't attract roaches and rodents. The compactor rooms are emptied twice daily by the porters and they are sanitized twice yearly. There are two bins located in each room, one for recyclable cardboard and paper and one for glass, bottles and cans. It is important for each resident to do his/her part in disposing of trash and recyclables properly. Recently there have been items left in these rooms that do not belong. Dirty plastic containers, opened, with food stuck to them, pizza boxes with sauce and cheese hanging from them, trash, such as hangers, linens and other large items that are supposed to be brought down to the basement. All bottles, containers and cans must be washed out before being placed in the bin. Pizza boxes, although cardboard, are not to be left in the compactor room but, instead, folded small enough to fit into a bag and thrown down the chute. We are trying to keep our building clean and attractive, free from unwanted "critters" and we must all cooperate to this end. Let's all work together for this common goal.

#### More Trash Talk....

- If a garbage bag is too large to throw down the compactor chutes, please bring it down to the basement. Do not leave garbage on the floor or shelf in the compactor room. Consider buying smaller trash bags.
- Furniture, mattresses, appliances and other large items cannot be just "left" in the basement. Arrangements must be made to have these items removed by the delivery people who bring your new items. If that is not possible, you must inform Chantel of your intent to leave the large item in the basement and you will be charged to have it removed. The charge for removing these large items will start at \$25 for each item.
- There have been complaints of residents storing items and trash in their garage spaces. The only thing to be left in the garage space is your vehicle and an empty shopping cart. All other items must be stored in your storage locker or in your apartment. Anything other than a vehicle and shopping cart will be removed by the staff. You will be contacted shortly regarding the deadline for removing these items. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

#### **REUSEABLE SHOPPING BAGS**

Reusable bags are still being collected for the South Presbyterian Church Food Pantry in Dobbs Ferry. Please deposit empty bags into the straw basket that is in the seating area of the lobby. They will be picked up by Meg Bussert and brought to the church, where they are very much needed and appreciated. Please make sure that the recycled bags are in good condition, clean and folded. Thanks to all of you who have been donating these bags for over a year now and continue to do so.

## THINGS TO DO IN WESTCHESTER

#### OUT AND ABOUT IN YONKERS -



PHILIPSE MANOR The oldest building in Yonkers, Philipse Manor Hall was built in three stages between the 1680s and 1750s by the Dutch Philipse family, who built their enormous

wealth in the fur trade with Munsee Lunaape and other Indigenous peoples, a global shipping empire, and the slave trade. Their landholdings in Westchester became Philipse Manor in 1693, and eventually they came to own much of what became Westchester and Putnam counties, populated by their tenant farmers and enslaved Africans. Frederick Philipse III was a Loyalist during the American Revolution and the family fled to England after the war. In the 19th century the manor hall became Yonkers City Hall, and later a historic site. Today, visitors can enjoy two floors of ADAaccessible exhibits chronicling the history of the Munsee Lunaape, the Philipse family, the people they enslaved, and their tenant farmers. Public events and community art gallery also hosted on site. Did vou know that parts of "The Godfather" were filmed right here in Yonkers? The historic Philipse Manor Hall was one of the iconic locations featured in this legendary movie!
