A MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLISHERS

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

Let your heart be a light that guides you through the darkness of winter, like Holiday lights in the night.

December is a month steeped in paradox, marked by the year's longest nights as it approaches the winter solstice on the 21st, yet it is equally recognized as a month of radiant light. Across the globe, varied traditions and celebrations in December embody the universal human longing to illuminate the darkness, bringing warmth, hope, and unity. These cultural practices span diverse beliefs, weaving together a rich tapestry of resilience and connection.

Hanukkah, starting on December 25th this year, is one of the celebrations of light in December. Known as the Festival of Lights, Hanukkah commemorates the historic victory of the Maccabees over the larger Syrian army and the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem. Central to this story is the miracle of the oil: a small quantity that should have lasted just one day kept the Temple's menorah lit for eight days. This enduring flame has become a powerful symbol of faith, resilience, and the victory of light over darkness. The nightly lighting of the menorah, where one candle is added each evening until all eight are aglow, serves not only as a reminder of the miraculous past but also as a testament to hope and unity in times of adversity.

Another widely celebrated tradition is **Christmas**, which reaches its culmination on December 25th but begins with anticipatory festivities such as the lighting and decorating of the Christmas tree. Many will start these traditions as early as December 1st. The modern Christmas tree has roots tracing back to Germany, where it was known as the "paradise tree" and associated with the feast day of Adam and Eve on December 24th. Its evergreen branches symbolize eternal life, and the tree is seen as a representation of the birth and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The lights strung on these trees today are more than simple decorations; they symbolize hope, joy, and the divine light that Jesus is believed to have brought into the world. decorative purpose to become a beacon of spiritual promise and renewal.

Kwanzaa, celebrated from December 26 to January 1, is a relatively recent addition to December's traditions, but it holds significant cultural importance, particularly among African American communities. The name Kwanzaa comes from the Swahili phrase meaning "first fruits," and it celebrates the principles of community and shared heritage. The kinara, a candle holder with seven candles, is the central symbol of Kwanzaa, each candle representing one of seven core principles: unity, self-determination, collective work and responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith. Each day, a new candle is lit, fostering reflection on these values. Kwanzaa's focus on gratitude, community, and cultural pride reminds participants of the importance of connectedness and shared values.

These celebrations highlight that light in December goes beyond its physical presence, taking on a metaphorical meaning of hope, enlightenment, and renewal. **Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol** encapsulates this through the character of Ebenezer Scrooge. His journey from a life shrouded in darkness to one illuminated by compassion and generosity, guided by the ghosts of Christmas past, present, and future, symbolizes personal transformation. It is a reminder that even the most hardened hearts can change, emphasizing the power of empathy and the enduring impact of kindness.

December's diverse celebrations, whether marked by the glow of menorahs, the sparkle of Christmas lights, or the vibrant flames of the kinara, collectively remind us of what truly matters: unity, compassion, and shared joy. The light of December, therefore, is more than seasonal decoration, it is a symbol of the resilience of the human spirit, guiding us through the darkest nights and encouraging us to share warmth and kindness with those around us.

GREYSTONE COMMUNITY GARDEN

We've closed up the garden beds and put away the hose, in preparation for the winter.

There are still some tasks to do, as it's not a good idea to leave bare soil - it invites weeds and erosion. We might plant cover

crops or we might put some mulch on the beds. We hope to have a few garden meetings this winter to discuss further garden projects.

Gardeners can keep busy even in winter - at least by reading and thinking about what to plant in spring!

A couple of interesting gardening notes came in my gardening newsletter this month. First of all, there is a right way and a wrong way to water vegetables. Wrong strategies include giving the plants a light daily sprinkle. It's better to water deeply and less often, as this prompts the plants to develop a robust root system and makes them more resistant to drought.

Second, did you know the weed purslane, that mass reddish stems with teardrop-shaped, succulent leaves that pop up all over our garden, is a nutritious superfood? I didn't! For many years, purslane was known as a remedy for skin conditions like inflammation and redness. Its value was recognized in ancient times when ancient Greeks named purslane as one of seven herbs for summer eating and advised wearing it as an amulet to ward off evil. In modern times, studies show that purslane is a good source of calcium and magnesium, and also show that eating purslane can reduce fasting blood sugar - important for those with Type 2 diabetes. I'm certainly going to treat this "weed" with a bit more respect now!
