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GREYSTONE COMMUNITY GARDEN

Gardeners can still keep busy, even in winter. We can **plan** for spring and order seeds or plants. Gardeners need to always adapt and keep learning, as well, so we can keep up with the natural world. There are many online gardening

workshops to help out - the Ardsley Pollinator Pathway organization offers many free online workshops. The Westchester Native Plant Center and the New York Botanical Garden are also great resources.

In our Greystone Garden, we still need to cover up some of the beds, so we don't leave bare soil exposed to the elements. We will cover some beds with straw. But leaves are also an excellent cover.

Instead of bagging fallen leaves and having a truck take them to a landfill, it's much better to use them as a cover for vegetable beds - or to even leave them in place. "Leaves are natural compost," says Meredith McGraw Bishop, founder of Bloom and Bounty. "Leaves will break down over winter and feed the soil life beneath. Additionally leaves give shelter to beneficial insects which virtually eliminate the need to use pesticides, ever."

In the Rivertowns area, the disappearance of leaf cover and the techniques used to achieve a bland, green suburban lawn have meant the end of the beautiful luna moth, which used to be a native in our area. Now that there is no habitat for the moth, there have been few sightings of the moth in the last few years. Who knows? Maybe if we leave our leaves, we'll be treated to the sight of a luna moth in a few years!

We live in a community at the Greystone. So, in consideration of each other *PLEASE* do the following so we do not attract rodents, roaches or other critters when disposing of our garbage. Your

participation will be most appreciated.

- ✓ All garbage <u>MUST</u> be bagged and tied before putting into the chute. Make sure bagged garbage is <u>pushed</u> down the chute before closing the door.
- ✓ Please break down cereal boxes (Costco size) and put in the recycle paper bin,
- ✓ Pizza boxes must be broken down and thrown down the chute.
- ✓ Do not leave large items and large bags of plastic bottles in the compactor room, bring them to the basement level and leave in the halls near the laundry rooms.
- ✓ Cooking oil should **never be poured down the sink or the toilet**. It should be poured into container (a can or glass jar) and frozen or just left to congeal, and then disposed of in the regular trash or food scraps.
- ✓ Cat litter must be tied securely in small bags that fit down the chute.
