Lyndhurst Museum is a Green Landscape Champion, leading the way in sustainable landscape practices that include on-site composting, leaf mulching, invasive vine removal and more.

There are so many invasive vines around - and it can be very difficult to remove some of them. This sounds like a great demonstration, and it might give local gardeners some good ideas.

- Receive weekly reminders for garbage and recycling collections
- Boost your recycling knowledge

A Few Tips to Make Things Easier for Our Staff

- Cat Litter Disposal: To prevent messes, always use small wastebasket-size bags for cat litter. If disposing of it down the chute, double-bag it for extra security.
- Pizza Boxes & Recycling: Do not put pizza boxes in the compost bin. Grease, cheese, and wax paper liners contaminate recycling. Only empty and clean pizza boxes should be recycled. Partially Soiled Boxes: If part of the box is dirty, tear off the soiled section and discard it, then recycle the clean portion with cardboard,

The History of Valentine's Day



Valentine's Day, celebrated on February 14th, has roots in ancient Roman and Christian traditions. It may have originated from Lupercalia, a Roman fertility festival held in mid-February. This pagan celebration was later replaced by a Christian feast day

honoring St. Valentine, a martyr whose exact identity is unclear.

One legend suggests Valentine was a priest who defied Emperor Claudius II by secretly marrying couples. Another story tells of Valentine sending a love note signed "From your Valentine" to a jailer's daughter before his execution.

During the Middle Ages, Geoffrey Chaucer linked Valentine's Day to romantic love in his poetry, sparking the tradition of exchanging love notes. By the 18th century, handwritten notes evolved into mass-produced cards, and Valentine's Day became a commercial celebration of love.

Today, it is a global holiday symbolizing love and affection, with traditions like gifting flowers, chocolates, and cards to loved ones.

Last year I saw a news blurb about billions of dollars in unclaimed money just waiting to be found. I was skeptical, but went to the website and put in my last and first name and hit "Search" and, of course, my name did not come up. So.....I told a family member about this andsuccess! She found her name and her address, clicked on her name. entered her info and submitted it and a few weeks later a check came to her in the amount of \$3000. She couldn't believe it! I then told my other relatives and friends and several did have money waiting for them....from \$50 up to several thousand. A few had money in more than one financial source, as well.

So, what a nice new year surprise it would be to get a check for money that belongs to you but that you didn't know you had! To claim your funds do the following...

- Go to osc.state.ny.us/unclaimed
- Enter your name last and first (or the name of your organization)
- If you find a match, click on your name for more information. You will be directed to submit your claim online.

There is no fee or charge to get your money. THIS IS LEGIT!

Money is waiting from bank accounts, dividends, estate proceeds, insurance benefits or refunds and policies, stocks, bonds, telephone, utility and security deposits, to name a few. There is also money from gift cards or returns from department stores that were never used or claimed. Check it out. You may be pleasantly surprised. Remember to also search using your maiden name, or the name of deceased relatives, etc., as there may be funds that were unclaimed and that will be sent to you if you provide a marriage license or proof of death in those situations.
